





Lolas' New Year's Eve at Docklands

While many members were celebrating New Year's Eve on Lambert Island and at other unspecified locations, a couple of members made the trip up to Docklands with their boats to stay at Melbourne City Marina. A New Year's Eve package is allocated by a ballot system. As well as having secured jetties there is a fully equipped mariners lounge with toilets, showers, kitchen & BBQ's, tv & internet, papers & magazines etc. There are also the bars, restaurants & full shopping facilities of Harbour Town (all a short walk away). Two Mordy boats, Lola and Wayne Imlachs, were lucky enough to secure moorings in the heart of Docklands with a direct view of Marvel stadium.

Lola made the trip up early on the 30th from Patterson Lakes at a leisurely 6 knots taking about 3 hours & 40 minutes to get to Docklands & tie up. There was the possible excitement of crossing the shipping channel with the commercial shipping traffic as you enter the Yarra, but there was not a cargo ship in sight and the crossing was uneventful (phew!).

The marina had a wide selection of boats moored up for New Years Eve ranging from small motor boats, trailerable yachts, ketches to super yachts. Lola was fortunate to be on the super yacht jetty which is quite wide and allows visitors to set up tables & chairs on the jetty to soak in the atmosphere. After a scrumptious BBQ in the Mariners lounge it was back to the jetty to see the night out.





As Marvel stadium was one of the fireworks official sites, we had an uninterrupted view of an awesome pyrotechnic display. Don't expect to get any sleep on NYE. The local restaurants / night clubs kick on to at least 2am and residents in the adjacent apartment towers can still be going strong at 5am

(BYO ear plugs!)

New Year's Day's splendid weather allowed a trip up the Maribyrnong River, a hidden gem. Once you get past the industrial sector you are treated to sweeping parklands and perched houses hugging the river bank. Public jetties are available to tie up to but are variable in quality & condition. After passing Flemington, an unexpected sight is the impressive 15m high statue of the Heavenly Queen (Mazu) – a Chinese Goddess of the Sea – with an accompanying spectacular Chinese temple.




Further along it was time to stop for lunch at the Boat House Cafe (which is on starboard side of the river) and has an accessible jetty. Another choice is the Anglers Tavern downstream slightly on Port, but it has a small one boat only jetty. We were able to get 2/3 of the way up the river with no problems with the bridges to that point, allowing boats 2.8m in height to pass easily underneath. Then it was time to head back to Docklands

Departure day was windy and a quick nose out into Port Phillip Bay revealed 1.5m waves and strong winds building. We decided that discretion was the better part of valour and retired to the safety of the Yarra. An alternative trip up the Yarra was less successful, with city planners in their wisdom installing numerous low bridges barring the way. Any boat 2.8m high or higher will struggle to get further than the Waters Edge Marina adjacent the Charles Grime Bridge.

The following departure day (take 2) – which was delayed by the vagaries of Melbourne's on/off public transport, we made it to the Yarra entrance. Here we were joined by a large cargo ship & accompanying tugs to the shipping channel. We made it to Sandringham before the wind picked up again and we sneaked in behind the rock wall, for an hour until the afternoon squirt petered out and allowed our safe arrival in Patterson lakes about 8pm. It was a very enjoyable trip and well worth the effort.







BOAT OF NOTE - FOREVER YOUNG




In the past we have run a series of stories concentrating on the history and make up of some of our vessels.

This article is concentrating on the Grand Lady of the MMYC. 'Forever Young' – a 21ft Couta Boat, was rescued by our Rear Commodore, Byron Douglas and a friend Gavin Sharp from the banks of Mordialloc Creek in a state that real estate agents would describe as a 'renovators delight'!!. Byron put in hundreds of hours over 12 years (packed away for three years while he renovated their house) to slowly but surely restore the old girl back to the Grand Lady she is today.

The history of Forever Young is not entirely known but is thought to have been built in the 40'/50's by Peter Locke of Queenscliff using a Lacco design. She is a 21ft couta boat and had lifting gear in the stern and in the keel and a stainless-steel soleplate around a false keel all giving credibility to the thought that she worked off Lorne Pier. There were a fleet of boats that operated off Lorne Pier and were lifted into the waters of Bass Straight by a crane that was stationed on the pier.

The couta boats were the unique fishing fleets of the Victorian coastal waters. They were named after the schools of barracouta they would catch in Bass Straight. The boats were designed for the fishermen to easily fish from (fish were caught on barbless hooks with a lure made from cow hide or tea tree and snagged and pulled into the boat) with the boats being designed to be fast. The first boats in go their catch off to market and got the best price! The boats wine glass shaped stern helped give them stability in the harsh waters of Bass Straight. The early boats had no engines and after the second world war most of the boats were fitted with engines. A couta boat was traditionally built in 6 – 8 weeks by two boat builders – without power tools!!!

Forever Young took 12 years to restore in Byron's driveway in Aspendale. In traditional terms she is a carvel hull boat with her hull timbers being NZ Kauri. The deck is QLD Beech with the gunwales of recycled Merbau. She is gaff rigged with her spars being recycled Oregon goal posts that a Council was throwing out for firewood! Her deck is new but most of the hull planking is original. She was built as a working vessel and we believe she was operated for many years in the waters of Apollo Bay. She has been fitted with an 8 – 10 hp Simplex petrol engine. They are still built and sold brand new by Hardman and Hall in Sydney, but they are very much 50's technology. At least Byron fitted an electronic start to his engine!



When Byron found the boat of his dreams, she was not a pretty sight – rumour around the creek was that she had sunk at one stage and the previous owners had stripped her in readiness for a restoration project that never got off the ground. Byron had to learn how to steam timbers, make the tools to rivet the timbers, scrounge suitable timbers, caulk the boat and design the rig according to the strict Couta Association racing rules. The new centreboard case alone took about 100 hours to fit and the timbers weighed 100 kilos and were moved in

and out of the boat 6 times to fit! Forever Young's name is a tribute to the many hours of listening to music as she was restored. Bob Dylan was on the playlist quite often and it seemed such a perfect name in the end.



Forever Young now spends much time sailing and racing within the MMYC yacht fleet and is the focus of many cameras as she regally sails past the Mordialloc Pier and along the coast line. No other sailing vessel is quite able to capture the imagination and turn back the time to when fisherman plied their trade using the wind as their sole source of transport. To see a Couta Boat under sail is somehow special and creates an atmosphere of peace and tranquillity. Modern Yachts will never emulate this quality and we are fortunate at MMYC to have amongst us three other bow sprit boats, 2 of which are Couta's with their own story to tell another time.
