AROUND THE CLUB -

Sailing Yacht News—Changes to the ThursdayRace Format.

Our yacht fleet activities have remained strong during the summer series with an average of 11 boats competing in both the Thursday twilight and Sunday Points races. With only 2 races to go the focus is on the points in what will be some very close results once the handicaps and dropped races are completed. We are also very excited at the potential of another number of yachts entering the fleet once moorings become available.

Thursday Yacht Race Changes.

Come April we'll be starting our Winter Series Sunday races and Thursday mid-afternoon races (Thursday Terrors)

We'll be trying something different for our start/finish and handicaps for the Thursday races ... more like what they do for the Twilights at Sandy

The main features will be:-

Around 2:30 start for the slowest boat.

PBH only. (Personal Basic Handicap)

Try and set a course that will take about 50-60 minutes for the fastest boat and less than 90 min for the slowest.

Every boat gets its own start time. (one minute minimum increments).

Where you finish over the line is your handicap finish.

5 min penalty for 1st place for next race.

3 min for 2nd.

1 min for 3rd. ... these numbers might be adjusted during the season.

As is usual, (and particularly more relevant for these races, as there will be no CBH, Class Basic Handicap) the handicappers reserve the right to adjust any boat's start time/ handicap for reasons such as :--- incorrect initial estimated start time (i.e. PBH), change of crew, performance change to equipment, etc.

Skippers may use spinnakers, but they must decide before their start and then start 2 min later than their gazetted start for boats that are normally Div 2 on Sundays, and 3 min for those that are usually Div 1. We're allowing spinnakers (with penalty) so that people can choose to practice that skill for the main game on the Sunday points races.

These races will be every Thursday (tide and weather permitting), so there will be a greater percentage of "dropped" races allowed. There will be aggregate points, with trophies or medallions at the end of season, depending on fleet numbers.

Dates for Winter Series (Sundays) points races TBA.

Motor Yacht News. (Power Boats) We'll regularly be keeping you up to date on the forthcoming activities. Watch out for coming Navigation training, navigation trials and on water boating and cruising activites

Fishing News and competitions. Fishing has settled with the last of the visiting schools of fish heading back out to the ocean. Time to settle in for the winter and work out where the resident fish are hiding. However when the Ti Tree is white again the frantic early morning activities of the fisherman will again generate the 'tall but true ???' stories of the ones that got away. Can't wait for that !!

Water Sports Centre. (formerly No.2 slipway). Is currently Work in progress and will operational soon. This will add a new dimension to the MMYC. Additional to our normal activities the WSC will open a new world of water sports, Motor Yacht and Sailing Yacht training, Stand Up Paddle Board training, kayaking etc. Our two sail training yachts have now been approved by YA, and are ready to hoist sails.

MMYC—Around The Creek







In recent times there has been much activity around the creek. Upstream the launching ramp and jetties have been improved with extra launching and retrieving waiting room and a dredged creek from the ramp to the railway bridge. Dredging of the permanent pens is always a topic simmering in the background. At our recent General Meeting former Commodore (2016 to 2020) Byron Douglas advised that local politicians both state and federal are being lobbied heavily to find the \$10M to deepen the creek itself. We remain cautiously optimistic with our hopes resting on the shoulders of the Mordialloc Creek Community. In the mean time Parks Victoria have upheld their declaration to keep the sand bar at the mouth of the creek as clear as possible, with the next dredging due in March. The creek mouth is dangerously shallow at the time of writing. As club mariners it's prudent we be sure of the creek depth and what the tide and wind will do whilst your out and about.

New sheet Pile works—

Members should be aware that New Sheet Pile Works along the mouth of the Mordialloc Creek will commence on Wednesday 16th March 2022 and continue for approximately seven months subject to weather. Sheet piling will be installed inside the existing sheet piling on both the North and and South sides of the



creek. The wave baffles will remain untouched and operational. The club has appointed Quartermaster **Wayne Imlach** to be the Communications Link on behalf of the MMYC to assist with the sheet piling works. Wayne will work in consultation with Peter and Marcus Allnutt when required. Please be mindful of construction equipment and truck movements and please observe signage and detours.

MARLAY POINT OVER NIGHT YACHT RACE

The following information was offered by Lyndon David, Debbie Barclay, Mark Barklay and Linda Swanson. Congratulations on representing the MMYC again this year.

The Marlay Point Yacht Race has been sailed every year since 1968. Entries peaked at the 400 mark back in the 1980s coincidentally when the generally light weather offered a couple of years of 50 knot gales.

The race these days is considered the pinnacle of trailable yachting and attracts entries nationwide. It is the "Sydney to Hobart' for trailable yachts.

A synopsis of events - We were the only Yacht from MMYC. Crew Mark and Debbie Barclay and Linda Swanson -THE 4 CRAPTAINS -

Blew out a trailer Tyre towing Serenity to LWYC .. this happened on the barricaded part of the highway - (as the usual route was flooded and road was closed). Bit of an issue, as there is no way to safely stand on the traffic side of the vehicle ... narrow single lane – and shoulder.

The 4WD that made a U turn and came to our assistance, just happened to be the race director _ Jackie _ awesome lady. Offered us assistance. We were all good by then and spare in place ready to continue.

During the briefing – Lots of pressure from the Carrum and MMYC sailors' all giving me advice – mostly consistent.

The pressure was on – I had to finish this race.

The winds were predicted to be a drifter. Mostly on the nose. Started pretty much on the Start line but a bit too close to the windward start boat... but then got "barged" and pushed into the start boat ... to avoid a collision, dropped back to start behind the field.

Hence our start was 7:50pm ... the official start 7:40pm. So, we were the last to cross the start line.


We made it to Plover Point at 12:59am - I promised my crew I will get them before 12 ... well there was a 12 in there somewhere We passed about 20 yachts by this time

We drifted thru McLennan Strait and the fog set in around 4am We spotted a yacht heading towards us ... turned out, is was – ROCKY – in magic bus going the wrong way ...!!

We yelled out into the milky cloud to the shadow that was Rocky - to follow us to Paynesville... we passed another 18 yachts. We made it to Hollands landing by 7am ... Normally I would get some sleep between the hours 3am-6am ... But not this year, I stayed up all night at the helm. Mark took over the helm around 8am and sailed us to Stoney point - and as tradition dictates – skipper finished the race.

We crossed the finish line at 1.05pm.

Boat of Note—Forever Young—Byron and Di

BOAT OF NOTE – "FOREVER YOUNG" –

Forever Young is a wooden boat, a veteran of the sea and as far as gaff rigged boats go she continues the romanticism sometimes connected to these fine vessels. Byron tells us the story of Forever Young below.

COUTA BOAT CIRCA 1946 -This article is concentrating on the Grand Lady of the MMYC. 'Forever Young' – a 21ft Couta Boat, was rescued by our Former Commodore, Byron Douglas and a friend Gavin Sharp from the banks of Mordialloc Creek in a state that real estate agents would describe as a 'renovators delight'!!. Byron put in hundreds of hours over 12 years (packed away for three years while he renovated their house) to slowly but surely restore the old girl back to the Grand Lady she is today.

The history of Forever Young is not entirely known but she is thought to have been built in the 40′/50′s by Peter Locke of Queenscliff using a Lacco design. She is a 21ft couta boat and had lifting gear in the stern and in the keel and a stainless steel soleplate around a false keel all giving credibility to the thought that she worked off Lorne Pier. There were a fleet of boats that operated off Lorne Pier and were lifted into the waters of Bass Straight by a crane that was stationed on the pier. The couta boats were the unique fishing fleets of the Victorian coastal waters. They were named after the schools of baracouta they would catch in Bass Straight. The boats were designed for the fishermen to easily fish from (fish were caught on barbless hooks with a lure made from cow hide or tea tree and snagged and pulled into the boat)

The boats were designed to be fast. The first boats in got their catch off to market first, getting the best price! The boats wine glass shaped stern helped give them stability in the harsh waters of Bass Straight. The early boats had no engines and after the second world war most of the boats were fitted with engines. A couta boat was traditionally built in 6-8 weeks by two boat builders – without power tools!!! Forever Young took 12 years to restore in Byron's driveway in Aspendale. In traditional terms she is a carvel hull boat with her hull timbers being NZ Kauri. The deck is QLD Beech with the gunwales of recycled Merbau. She is gaff rigged with her spars being recycled Oregon goal posts that a Council was throwing out for firewood! Her deck is new but most of the hull planking is original. She was built as a working vessel and we believe she was operated for many years in the waters of Apollo Bay. She has been fitted with an 8-10 hp Simplex petrol engine. They are still built and sold brand new by Hardman and Hall in Sydney but they are very much 50's technology. At least Byron fitted an electronic start to his engine!



When Byron found the boat of his dreams she was not a pretty sight — rumor around the creek was that she had sunk at one stage and the previous owners had stripped here in readiness for a restoration project that never got off the ground. Byron had to learn how to steam timbers, make the tools to rivet the timbers, scrounge suitable timbers, caulk the boat and design the rig according to the strict Couta Association racing rules. The new centerboard case alone took about 100 hours to fit and the timbers weighed 100 kilos and were moved in and out of the boat 6 times to fit! Forever Young's name is a tribute to the many hours of listening to



music as she was restored and Bob Dylan was on the playlist quite often and it seemed such a

perfect name in the end.

Forever Young now spends much time sailing and racing within the MMYC yacht fleet and is the focus of many cameras as she regally sails past the Mordialloc Pier and along the coast line. No other sailing vessel is quite able to capture the imagination and turn back the time to when fisherman plied their trade using the wind as their sole source of transport. To see a Couta Boat under sail is somehow special and creates an atmosphere of piece and tranquility.

We thank Byron for this story and look forward to next months BOAT OF NOTE—a power boat with a great story.

His wife is an OHS specialist and runs her own company, OHS and HR Management Services, and John reckons he will be calling on her support at times.


