



Brewer, of the Royal Victorian Yacht Club, won the race with his cruiser, "Orion" and though no Mordialloc boats were included in the place getters, we were very well represented in the race itself. Wells), "Stella Maris" (A. Bowden), "Kelvina" (L. Reece), "Penguin" (C. Ruse), "Olga" (F. Paice), "Cape Cod" (I. Melen), "Peter Pan" (L. J. Wright), "Irene" (K. Glenister), "West Wind" (R. Edwards) "Venette" (S. Hiam), and "Cyrene" (P. Barlow). A very good muster indeed.

In the Shoot and Bang Race, held in the afternoon, Frank Paice, in "Olga" was successful, thus winning the gold watch to be presented by Mr. Whalley.

EDITORIAL ...

Flag Etiquette

With the advent of suitable yachting weather, no doubt some of you will be sailing about Port Phillip Bay, and possibly, calling into the harbors of other Yacht Clubs, where keen eyes will be on the look out for any small faults in seamanship or yachting etiquette. Therefore, perhaps, the time is now appropriate to discuss a little matter which we will call "Flag Etiquette."

By memorising the following lines, you will, maybe, save yourself and your crew from embarrassing comments from the hard-bitten shellbacks who are always ready to criticise visiting yachtsmen, and who are invariably found lounging around docks, piers, and yacht clubs yards.

Well, here it is :-

It is illegal to wear the white or blue ensign, unless a special warrant from the Admiralty has been obtained. The Union Jack is not worn on yachts unless the King is on board. The Red Ensign — or preferably the Red Australian Flag, should be at the ensign staff (astern) on Power Boats and at the peak of the after gaff on Sailing Craft. There is no stipulation for Auxiliary Yawls under power, lacking gaff and stern staff. The mizzen head is the best alternative, although some authorities are against it. Never, at the main.

Club Burgees, that of the Senior Club on top, are worn at the main. Failing a main mast, at the jack-staff in the bows. Never at the stern staff. When there is no Club Burgee, the house flag can be worn at the main, although its correct place in a single masted ship, with or without Club Burgee, is at the starboard yard arm or spreader. Some authorities maintain that with a two-masted ship the house-flag should be worn at the minizen head.

Only the Ensign or Red Australian Flag is dipped in salute. It is lowered slowly to approximately two-thirds mast-head height, kept there till the salute is acknowledged and then raised slowly to the truck once more.

IMPORTANT: Lower your flags and burgees at sunset. It is pure laziness and bad seamanship NOT to do so.

For those who do not desire to wear a dinner jacket, an ordinary Sac suit with collar and tie is in order, but we do think the occasion calls for something a little better than an opennecked shirt and we are NOT being snobbish

Writing of suitable wearing attire, reminds us of the large number of rembers who never stop to think how ch damage can be done to the deck of a boat, when they stride aboard (none too lightly) wearing ordinary leather soled shoes. There are Yachting Clubs in Sydney — and other parts, where you are most unwelcome, unless wearing rubber or rope soles and shoes so covered are now readily obtainable and are quite comfortable to wear and attractive to look at. It's a fashion some of us could cultivate. Mr. Frank Paice, owner and skipper of the "Olga," and whom, you will remember, won the Shoot and Bang race on the last Whalley Cup Day, is now the First Citizen of Nunawsding, having been installed in the very high office of Mayor at a recent Council meeting.

Two very nice tubular steel armchairs and a honey-blonde writing desk for use in the Secretary's office, have been delivered to the Club. Combined with the four garden seats and the beautiful stainless steel sink, donated by Mr. L. Seaborne, these items are all helping to make that homely atmosphere which is such a strong feature at our Headquarters. The paragraph in last month's "Anchor," dealing with the accentuation of corrosion of iron in sea-water when in contact with non-ferrous metals. caused quite a buzz, but we can assure members that the figures printed ARE correct. Seeing that most motor boats which rely on salt water for cooling have either a copper or brass pipe or fitting, to lead the salt water to the engine, this explains the rapid corrosion which takes place in the water jacket and explains the desirability of freshwater cooling. The latest marine motors have fresh water cooling as a built-in system; but quite a good substitute is obtained by running a length of copper tubing on the outside of the hull through a couple of skin-fittings and thence to the engine pump. Only a small reservoir of fresh water is required, the heat being transferred through the aforementioned copper tubing. However, it is an advantage when using this system to add about 10% of cutting compound, as used on on engineer's lathe, to the cooling water. For complete efficiency, it should be the aim to keep the cooling water in the engine at about 160 degrees and we have been advised that this figure can be maintained by allowing about one foot of $\frac{3}{4}$ " copper tubing outside the hull for every horse-power which the engine generates.
